1st Pride Flag

Hot pink = Sex

Red = Life

Orange = Healing

Yellow = Sunlight

Green = Nature

Turquoise = Magic/Art

Indigo = Serenity

Progressive Pride Flag

- Red = Life
- Orange = Healing
- Yellow = Sunlight
- Green = Nature
- Blue = Harmony
- Violet = Spirit
- Black = People no longer living / Stigma surrounding community
- Brown = POC Communities / AIDS
- Light Blue, Pink, White Chevron = Trans Individuals

Bisexual Pride Flag

- Pink = Possibility of same sex attraction
- Royal Blue = Possibility of opposite sex attraction
- Deep Lavender/Purple = Possibility of attraction anywhere along the spectrum

Transgender Pride Flag

- Light Blue = Traditional color for baby boy
- Light Pink = Traditional color for baby girl
- White = Those who identify as intersexual, Transitioning, or consider themselves as having neutral or undefined gender

Asexual Pride Flag

- Black = Asexuality
- Grey = Grey Sexuality (Grey area between Asexual and Sexual) and Demi Sexual
- White = Sexuality
- Purple = Community

InterSexual Pride Flag

- The two outer lavender stripes = Spirit
- The middle stripe blends pink and blue = A mix between male and female



PanSexual Pride Flag

- Pink = Female
- Blue = Male
- Gold = Mixed gender, Genderless, Third gender

Queer People Of Color Pride Flag

- Red = Life
- Orange = Healing
- Yellow = Sunlight
- Green = Nature
- Blue = Harmony
- Violet = Spirit
- BLack / Brown = promote diversity and inclusion and to "honor the lives of our Black and brown LGBTQ siblings,

Gender Fluid Pride Flag

- Pink = Femininity
- Blue = Masculinity
- Purple = Both Masculinity and Femininity
- White = All genders
- Black = No gender


Gender Queer Pride Flag

- Lavender = Androgyny
- White = Agender
- Green = Nonbinary

Non Binary Pride Flag

- Yellow = Gender outside of a binary
- White = Mix of all colors / Those with many genders
- Purple = Those who feel both binary male and female, Or fluid between them
- Black = A-gender Community without sexuality or color

Demi Sexual Pride Flag

- Black = Asexuality
 - White = Sexuality
 - Purple = Community
 - Grey = Grey Asexuality and Demisexuality

Aromantic Pride Flag

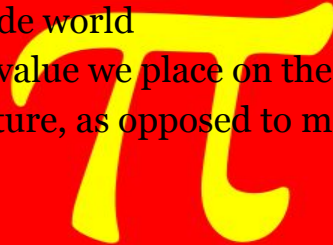
- Dark Green = Aromantic
- Light Green = The Aro Spectrum
- White = Lithromantic
- Grey = Grey Aro Spectrum
- Black = Demi Romantics

AGender Pride Flag

- Black / White = Absence of gender
- Grey = Semi Genderless
- Green = Nonbinary Genders

Polyamory Pride Flag

- Blue= Openness and honesty among all partners
- Red = Love and Passion
- Black = Solidarity with those who though they are open with all participants of their relationship, must hide those relationships from the outside world
- Gold Greek lowercase letter “PI” = the value we place on the emotional attachment to others, be the relationship friendly or romantic in nature, as opposed to merely primarily physical relationships



Two Spirit Pride Flag

The term *two spirit* was adopted in English, and created in Ojibwe, in 1990 at the third annual Native American/First Nations gay and lesbian conference in Winnipeg, Manitoba, Canada, as a replacement for *berdache*. The decision to adopt this new, pan-Indian term was deliberate, with a clear intention to distance themselves from non-Native gays and lesbians, as well as from non-Native terminology like *berdache*, "gay", "lesbian", and "trans".

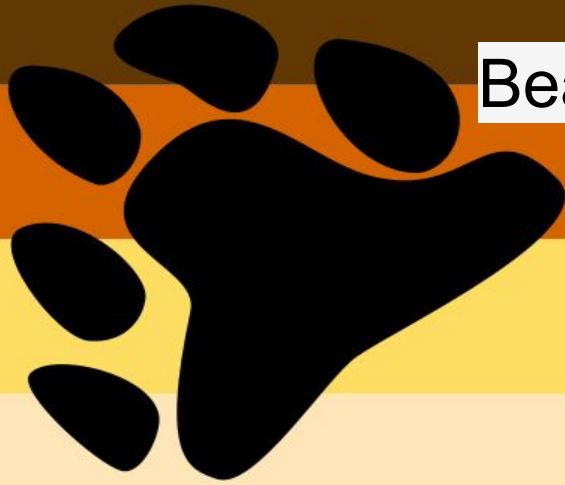


Straight Ally Pride Flag

- A = Allies
- Rainbow = LGBTQIA+
- Black/White = Cisgender/Heterosexual



Bear Brotherhood Pride Flag



The **colours** of the **flag** are meant to include the **colours** of the furs of animal **bears** throughout the world, not necessarily referring to human skin and hair **colour** tones: Dark brown, orange/rust, golden yellow, tan, white, gray, and black. The **flag** was designed with inclusion in mind.

Leather, Latex, & BDSM Pride Flag

This symbol is not exclusively gay, but rather for the leather and BDSM community. The original flag is on display at the Leather Archives and Museum in Chicago.

Rubber Pride Flag

"This flag is used as a means to identifying like-minded men and [it] reflects the sensory, sensual, and mental passion we have for rubber." They say the black color represents "our lust for the look and feel for shiny black rubber," the red symbolizes "our blood passion for rubber and rubbermen," while yellow highlights "our drive for intense rubber play and fantasies."

Lipstick Lesbian Pride Flag



"it celebrates the femmes in the lesbian community, lovingly called "lipstick lesbians."

Pony Play Pride Flag

Pony play is a distinct fetish where people are treated like horses by wearing hooves, ears, and saddles and pulling carts. Carrie P created this flag in 2007; it uses black in solidarity with the leather community at large.



Gay Male Pride Flag

Consisting of Primarily masculine colors, This flag represents men who are sexually attracted to other men.



Lesbian Pride Flag

Consisting of primarily feminine colors, this flag represent women who are sexually attracted to other women
